Drake

Thank Me Later (June 15)

Lowdown: Drake has been hiphop's superstar-in-waiting for the past couple of years. The Canadian rapper/singer/actor, signed to Lil Wayne's Young Money label, has built an impressive résumé of guest appearances and hot mixtapes. His starstudded, seven-song EP, So Far Gone, which features hit singles Best I Ever Had and Successful, has sold 432,000 copies since its release in September. He's currently headlining the Away From Home tour of college campuses, which wraps up in May.

Highlights: First single *Over* is already scooting up the pop and urban charts and whetting appetites for *Thank Me Later*, which will feature collaborations with Jay-Z, Kanye West and Lil Wayne.

Tom Petty & The Heartbreakers

Mojo (June 15)

Lowdown: After 34 years, Petty and company haven't lost their rock 'n' roll mojo or their loyal 'n' patient fans, who haven't had a studio fix since 2002's *The Last DJ*. The band has sold 60 million records since its 1976 debut and remains a powerhouse on the road, racking up its biggest tour grosses to date in 2008. They'll add *Mojo* tunes to the hit-laden set list on a tour that runs June 25 through October.

Highlights: Inspired by his early band Mudcrutch, Petty recorded live in the studio with no overdubs or studio gimmicks. On Southern-tinged electric and acoustic songs, the band moves from rock and country to romantic balladry and an unexpected reggae romp. Petty's tales include a blues-rocker about Thomas Jefferson's dalliance with slave Sally Hemings.

with raising her 2-year-old son, Max, and filming the upcoming movie musical *Burlesque*. On *Bionic*, she's shooting for a futuristic, electronic vibe.

Highlights: Pulsating lead single Not Myself Tonight was produced by Polow da Don, one of several collaborators, who include M.I.A., Santigold, Goldfrapp, Le Tigre, Linda Perry and Ladytron.

Jack Johnson

To the Sea (June 1)

Lowdown: After backing away from the beach motif, Hawaii's surfing son of a surfer again rides the wave that initially galvanized fans. Johnson's green sensibility extends beyond his lyrics. His fifth solo disc is packaged in recycled paper and was recorded in a solar-powered studio. All his profits from a tour starting in June will go to environmental groups and other charities. Johnson's broad, loyal fan base should ensure a No. 1 debut (2008's Sleep Through the Static topped the chart for three weeks) and multiplatinum future.

Highlights: Likening the ocean to the subconscious, Johnson sings warm, heartfelt pop-rock tunes in praise of truth, self-expression and nature. First single *You and Your Heart* is friskier than his usual acoustic fare. And while many songs are deeply personal, all 13 tracks bear Johnson's breezy stamp.

Game

The R.E.D. Album (June 15)

Lowdown: The hard-core L.A. rapper announced his retirement after 2008's LAX, which sold more than 700,000 copies. He's back with a star-studded affair that he's coexecutive-producing with Pharrell Williams, one that promises to be packed with trunk-rattling jams.

Highlights: Game gets contributions from his idol, Dr. Dre, in addition to collaborations with Snoop Dogg, Rick Ross, Lil Wayne, Gucci Mane, Nicki Minaj and Lady Gaga. The venomous street anthem It Must Be Me is the lead single. He's joined by Justin Timberlake on Ain't No Doubt About It.
